International Projects

AFRICA	\$330,510
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CAMEROON

NAKA Unity Farming Group, Bamenda **\$8,500**

To ensure success, this group has already acquired farmland, farmhouses, and farm tools. This project will help them purchase a Cassava Mill and farming equipment. The group will receive training in farming and cassava processing.

Cornerstone Vision Center, Bamenda **\$15,775**

Members of this group are unemployed and unable to feed their families. To provide stable income for the membership, they will purchase, breed and fatten pigs. Such a project will not only improve the lives of this group, but of people in other communities who see the possibilities and benefits being experienced by this group.

Ntankah Women's Cassava Project, Bafut **\$10,500**

A group of 65 low-income women will increase their farming skills in cassava cultivation, processing and marketing. Through training they will be able to obtain high yielding cassava vines and use the by-products for livestock feeding. Additionally, the project will ensure family food security for members and increase living standards.

Yemngia Oil Palm Farm Project **\$15,000**

Palm oil is highly consumed by the entire community. Through the purchase of equipment and training, this group of people will gain the skills and knowledge of palm tree farming and processing oil that is utilized in various products in their community.

DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF CONGO

Femme Debout (Standing Woman), Kinshasa **\$16,500**

This cooperative will enable these women to buy a flour mill to grind manioc, maize, soy and stock/store the ground products. The products will then be used and sold throughout the year. The cooperative also provides an opportunity for these Congolese women to receive educational opportunities and the ability to establish credit.

Boyokani, Kinshasa **\$18,750**

This group is able to reduce their community's expenditures on clothing by two thirds simply by becoming the manufacturers. The grant will go toward buying the equipment needed to knit, crochet, sew and market their products. This will help increase dignity, self-esteem and provide income for several households.

Democratic Republic of Congo (cont.)

Breeders Group, Kinshasa \$8,000

Thirty-eight women who have experience breeding rabbits and pigs are now able to purchase their own along with the necessary food and storage facilities for a successful breeding business. The Presbyterian Church in Kinshasa has also made available to them a farm so that they can raise vegetables to continue to feed the animals.

Kinshasa Pig Farm Association, Kinshasa \$9,120

According to the World Bank the National GDP per capita in the Congo is \$85 and the official unemployment rate is 80%. This group came together to purchase 800 sq. meters of land, build 10 pig pens, construct a storage depot and a sentry house. This grant will substantially increase this community's ability to generate income thus improving their living conditions.

Christians Together Against Poverty, Kinshasa \$12,170

Poverty and hunger are unfortunately a normal part of life for this community. This cooperative will go along way in changing that reality. By raising chickens this group will be able to improve their personal diets as well as generate additional income.

GAMBIA

Nyakoi Kerewan Fruittree/Orchard Project, Kerewan Village \$9,712

The people in this rural village have created this project to address poor nutrition and low economic opportunities. They will build a well for irrigation and a fence to surround an orchard of fruit trees and a vegetable garden. The group will then harvest and sell the produce as well as use the produce to feed those in the village.

GHANA

Dam and Water Piping System, Kumasi dd Tafo, Ahawia-Meduma \$40,000

With funds acquired from other sources this community has already been able to lay the foundation for a much needed dam. The funds from SDOP will help complete the project which will bring water to a community that has historically had to go miles to "fetch" water from waterholes or purchase it from others.

A Public KVIP, Abutia Kissoflui Kpogadzi \$5,800

In this very poor peasant community, there are no toilet facilities. Periodically there are outbreaks of cholera and other diseases associated with poor sanitation. This project seeks to correct that condition by building public toilet facilities on land that is already available to them.

KENYA

Mbukima Self-Help Group, Mbuuni Village, Machakos \$30,000

This cooperative project will construct concrete water tanks to collect rainwater from 100 individual roofs to provide clean water for village families. The present water source for the village is the river which is polluted, and not always available depending on the season. Villagers have to walk great distances to find potable water. That will no longer be the case for this community as a result of this grant.

MOZAMBIQUE

Cooperativa Agro-Pecuaria de Nyamatona, Chimoia \$11,000

Since 2001, fifteen low-income families have cooperatively farmed five hectares and have access to an additional 95 hectares. They seek to raise enough food for the families to eat for the entire year. The harvest is shared equally by all families.

SENEGAL

Rice Mill, Lampsar Farming Women's Cooperative, Lampsar \$6,000

This cooperative is a group of women, heads of households', mainly young widows, who organized themselves to promote women's access to farming innovation techniques and natural resource management. The rice mill will move the women of Lampsar from a position of subsistence farming into farming for revenue generation to help move their families out of the conditions that accompany their severe poverty.

SIERRA LEONE

Women's Agriculture Development Association, Rowollon \$12,333

Agricultural rehabilitation and development and production and income generation for women are the two main reasons this program was developed. Most of the women participants are war widows and are in need of employment. The funds will pay for land use, training workshops on improved crop production practices, distribution of farm products to program members, technical assistance, and marketing.

Community Animal Restocking, Nynyhu Animal Farmers Association, Nynyhu \$10,990

The Nynyhu Animal Farmers Association, a group of 80 farm families, came together to form a farming cooperative. The project is the restocking of goats and pigs that were lost to the rebels through the 10 years of raiding farms during the unrest and the rebuilding of the paddock to care for the animals.

SUDAN

Sewing Project, Young Orphans, Khartoum \$6,600

The Young Orphans are a group of young people who came together to support each other socially, financially, and morally. They lost their parents during the on going civil war in Southern Sudan. The project will help them seek a better life for themselves, help pay for their education, and provide a means of income from the sales of the garments they produce.

TANZANI

Tumanini Youth Group, Njombe \$10,000

This group of men and women established a cooperative of tailoring and knitting. They currently operate small enterprises in space donated by a church. They plan to expand, build a workshop and upgrade their equipment to increase production.

TOGO

Groupement des Agriculteurs de Itodou Haut (GAIH), Itodou Haut \$9,000

This project has four primary goals. They are to: increase the income status of its members, develop their capacity to make decisions and see them through, improve community participations, and develop the capacity to sustain crops for increased production and profit. The funds from this grant helped purchase supplies and equipment necessary to fulfill those goals.

UGANDA

Bughumba Butyoka Women's Group, Fort Portal \$21,299

This co-operative project was developed to construct a bakery, provide vocational training in crafts, sewing and seminars on poverty, agricultural and family planning. Because the women of the village are poor, this project, especially the bakery, provides a means for economic stability.

Grain Processing Plant, Rwesande Women's Club, Western Province \$11,811

The establishment of a grain processing plant will generate income for this group of women and ultimately lead to their empowerment. The plant will improve the quality of foods processed locally, save time spent using traditional methods of food processing and empower a group of rural poor women by providing an income generating activity.

**Self Empowerment Action Group, Odekere Village,
Amuria Katatwi \$18,000**

This project seeks to provide women in this community access to land, animals and other resources that will enable them to produce products that will give them food and increase their financial resources. Specifically, they will receive education and training, construct beehives, produce honey, purchase oxen and learn marketing strategies and techniques.

ACEN Widows Concern (ACW), Apac \$9,130

Formed in 1995 and composed of widows and youths, this group will learn new and improved ways to breed and raise goats. This alone will assist them in improving their diets and income.

ZAMBIA

**Chikankata Goat Project, Zambia National Association of the
Physically Handicapped Group, Chikankata Southern \$4,520**

This is a group of disabled people, working cooperatively to breed goats, selling the mature ones in the market place to improve their living standards. The grant will help pay for education and some supplies.

ASIA \$41,640

INDIA

**Cattle Rearing and Dairy Development Project,
Tamil Nadu \$7,800**

A group of 39 tribal women will create local employment by learning animal rearing and husbandry. This venture will allow them to have sustainable income and gain back some of the human rights they have lost over the years.

**Stone Breaking & Gravel Making Activity, Indira Mahila
Self Help Group, Cuddapah District \$8,945**

This project is simple, but not easy. This group of women will gather rocks, stones and boulders. They will break them into small pieces of gravel and then sell the gravel that is used to build roads, foundations, buildings, and cement, etc. Funds from this grant will go toward purchasing equipment to make the task easier and safer.

Gandhi Grama parivarthana Sangh, Tamil Nadu \$3,064

This is a low-income, low-caste group who are neglected and marginalized by society. Learning the skill of making various “in demand” ropes will enable them to obtain regular income to meet their basic needs.

Vivekananda Nagar, Kothapeta, Andhra Pradesh \$11,061

Three self-help groups from urban and rural areas have come together to augment their income and improve their self-confidence and self esteem with three activities: embroidery and dressmaking, duck rearing, and wire basket making.

Kamala Nehru Group, Gudipatipalli \$5,750

By purchasing, tending and reselling sheep the members of this group can now become more independent and develop a sustainable income.

Indira Mahila Group, Kattakrindhipalli A.P. \$5,020

This grant will assist this group purchasing 24 milk buffalo, insurance, feed and fodder for their and their families survival. This will provide them with food, income and get them started along the path of self-sufficiency.

LATIN AMERICA AND CARIBBEAN	\$157,200
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DOMINICA**Grand Fond Sunrise Women's Group, Grand Fond \$20,000**

Many women of Grand Fond are single heads of families. Their children do not have sufficient food to eat because economic conditions are very bad. The women need to learn skills so that they can seek employment in order to provide for their families. This project will provide them with exactly that; training in sewing, food preparation, preserving and catering skills.

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC**Candy Factory, Guerra, Santo Domingo \$10,000**

Women in this extremely low-income area formed a cooperative to make and market their homemade candies. To do that more effectively larger and better equipment was needed. By generating income the women are able to provide hot meals for their families, better educational opportunities, and access to health care. At the same time building their self-esteem and confidence.

Craft Production, Santo Domingo \$10,000

This group is working together to expand their craft and garment production and sales capabilities to improve their economic conditions and develop greater power to advocate for legislation positively affecting themselves and others that are handicap.

Refugees in Abandoned School, Santo Domingo \$20,000

As the result of a hurricane in 1998, thirty-six (36) families were left completely homeless and have had to live in an abandoned school house with no electricity, running water, doors or finished floors. The government has finally agreed to give them houses, but they are unfinished. This grant will provide them with the necessary resources to complete the houses and once again have homes to live in.

ECUADOR**Chimbenas Women's Association in Action, San Jose de Chimbo, Bolivar \$5,885**

This micro-business will help this community better utilize their skills and experience in making dresses and handicrafts. With the purchase of at least (3) sewing machines, they are now able to make and sell work, sport and bed clothes.

EL SALVADOR**Adesco/Pastoral Agents, Berlin, Usulután \$25,000**

A group of 81 families living 3 or more kilometers from the city of Berlin came together to develop a way to bring electricity to their homes and farms through the installation of solar panels. Such a system reduces the costs families now pay for batteries, gas lamps and candles and improve health and safety conditions as well.

GUATEMALA**Development Committee "El Rincon," San Martin Jilotepeque, Chimaltenango \$12,500**

Deforested land is not only unproductive, but is also vulnerable to mudslides. Wood used for cooking from these forests is now not only hard to find, but was a health hazard due to the smoke. This project will grow trees to reforest newly acquired, but badly deforested land, and build improve cooking stoves.

Development Local Group, La Esperanza \$10,000

Not having an opportunity to study and develop a trade, this community needed to develop an alternate form of income. What they discovered was that there was money in garbage. By sorting the local garbage, they were able to find valuable items that could be resold. This project provides them with the machinery and training they need to do this more effectively and efficiently.

HAITI

Group Sipo Magazen, (GSM), Leogane \$20,000

This group of marginalized women suffers from Lymphatic Filiarisis, an irreversible disease that permanently disfigures its victim. Needing each other's support and an economic base, they decided to set up a store that will sell products to members at below market prices. This grant helps pay for many of the start-up costs involved in such an operation.

HONDURAS

Trujillo Bakery Project, Reposteria de Las Flores Group, Trujillo, Colon \$9,675

The women in this community saw an opportunity and seized it. There was neither a bakery nor restaurant in the entire village. With this grant they will establish their own bakery store and restaurant where not only the village can be served, but also visitors.

MEXICO

Café Justo/Just Coffee, Agua Prieta, Sonora \$10,000

In the last decade, the price of coffee has fallen in a drastic way and has forced many families in this community to leave their lands. This cooperative was formed to give hope to families who were willing to stay. The project cultivates, roasts and exports its own coffee, making them the owners of the entire process and profits.

NICARAGUA

Rural Community of Obraje Farming Project, Villa Nueva \$4,140

As a result of this grant, over seven hundred and fifty individuals are now learning how to implement soil conservation and recuperation techniques, improve and increase vegetable production, initiate intensive earthworm and warm manure production, and improve chicken and goat production all to increase economic stability.

ISRAEL

The Laborer's Voice, Nazareth \$5,500

Since 1999 The Laborer's Voice has been an information volunteer network of about 200 Palestinian/Israeli Arab women fighting for their unemployment benefits, which were illegally cut off. This project will include employment and job training, a continuing public awareness campaign, and an after school program.

DOMESTIC PROJECTS

MIDWEST	\$224,100
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Albany Park Day Laborer Cooperative of the Latino Union, Chicago, IA **\$20,000**

A group of low-income, immigrant day laborers gathering on street corners to look for day work have built relationships with elected officials, residents, organizations and contractors with the goal of establishing a Workers Center in Albany Park. The Workers Center will be a temporary agency with the day laborers negotiating directly with employers for job for themselves.

American United Forces, Sioux City, IA **\$20,000**

In the Sioux-City area, unemployment and underemployment are high, especially in the immigrant community. Many of the immigrants possess skills and unique talents but are unable to use them for lack of resources to purchase equipment and materials. Through this co-op they can share costs and expenses becoming self-sufficient more quickly.

Community Organizing Project, Adair-Madison Citizens for Community Improvement, Stuart, IA **\$20,000**

Development often occurs without taking into account the environmental impact of the development. This permanent, membership-based, democratically controlled grass roots organization will work to positively influence environmental, social and economic issues in the two counties of Adair and Madison, in west central Iowa.

Latino Americano, Waterloo, IA **\$20,000**

There are many services available to Hispanic residents in the Cedar Valley area but there is no way to let those who do not read English know about the services. This project is to develop a Hispanic language newspaper containing items of information specific to the Cedar Valley area with free distribution.

K. I. Sawyer Community Association, Gwinn, MI **\$17,000**

This community was established in 1996 in the vacated housing of the K.I. Sawyer Air Force Base after the base was closed. The Association was formed to provide a voice through which the residents, working together could build a vibrant, prosperous community. Funding will be used for training, improvement of the monthly newspaper, and community dialogues.

Grass Roots Organizing Health Rights Access Project Mexico, MO **\$35,000**

This organization believes that basic health care for all, regardless of ability to pay, is a fundamental human right. By offering a voice of accountability this group hopes to create systemic changes that will improve access to healthcare for their families and others like them.

Renewing Rural MO, Milan, MO **\$20,000**

With a tremendous increase in Spanish-speaking residents, Milan is in need of immediate bilingual government employees, especially for driver license testing as is required by Missouri law. The project's goal is to get more bilingual officers in place for the short-term while the new immigrants learn English.

Valley Transportation, Valley, NE **\$32,100**

A group of elderly and disabled individuals formed a non-profit co-op to provide transportation to doctors' appointments, shopping and other outings that require transportation to larger cities.

EDT Ex-Offender Discernment, Dayton, OH **\$20,000**

This project addresses and strongly condemns the widespread, deeply entrenched discriminatory employment practices that relegate ex-offenders to poverty and oppressive living conditions. Through this grant they will learn marketable skills that make re-entry into society much smoother.

Midwest (cont.)

Voices Beyond Bars, Madison, WI \$20,000

Voices Beyond Bars was born in Spring 2002 when a few former prisoners came together to discuss their common concerns and firm desire to become a voice for those beyond the bars as well as those still behind bars. This project seeks to establish a structured rehabilitation program to help ex-offenders re-enter society successfully and decrease incidents of re-incarceration.

NORTHEAST	\$210,000
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OPERATION REACHOUT – Southwest, Baltimore, MD \$30,000

Through group meetings and workshops this group will learn creative and positive ways to battle crime, poverty and low self-esteem issues plaguing their neighborhoods. Made up of more than 300 people from the community, the organization is working toward developing and strengthening their community network for greater leverage and positive action.

Empower Women To Be Self-Sufficient, Raices Latinas, Hollyoke, MA \$35,000

A group of Latina Women have organized to find and provide support in areas of personal and professional skill development. As a result of this project they will have a place to meet, use the Internet, other office equipment and develop entrepreneurial skills.

Excalaber Cards Development Group, Roxbury, MA \$20,000

Excalaber Cards Development Group is a cooperatively owned greeting card business that is owned controlled and directly benefits previously incarcerated men and women. The project members design, market, manufactures and sell original cards to corporations and private individuals. This project addresses the chronic unemployment and under-employment of ex-prisoners.

Community Day Center of Waltham, Waltham, MA \$15,000

The homeless usually do not have a place to go to prepare for interviews, use computers, receive mail or make phone calls. The Community Day Center provides this resource and a place to receive counseling and other help needed to transition back into the working world. The project is run by the disenfranchised with assistance from the local community and local churches.

Rochester Food Not Bombs, Inc., Rochester, NY \$25,000

This project was developed to refurbish leased facilities that will be used to expand food handling and storage facilities for large quantities of both non-perishable and perishable food currently going to waste. The project provides food for the members of the organization, as well as education, training and leadership opportunities.

PEACE IN THE STREETS, Chester, PA \$30,000

This group of citizens came together to address the violence on the streets of Chester. They hope to effect change by creating a culture of peace through non-violent methods of citizen actions, violence prevention education and outreach and advocacy for more resources in the city.

Community Leadership Institute, Philadelphia, PA \$25,000

This grassroots group, based in North Philadelphia is focusing its efforts on training and organizing its non English-speaking, poor residents around the issues of unjust use of eminent domain, and the exclusion of residents from the planning/redevelopment process.

Cooperative Action Program of Southern McDowell County, Panther, WV \$30,000

This group organized to provide the necessary tools to raise the standard of living of the members. They will focus on health, nutrition, education, and advocacy.

SOUTH**\$233,207****Choctaw Community Development Center, Inc., Butler, AL \$20,000**

Citizens, in this very poor county of West Alabama, faced with social and economic problems have committed themselves to projects of education, empowerment, and mentoring. The project will accomplish this by purchasing educational materials, sponsoring GED and job training and establishing a computer lab.

The Northside Neighborhood Council, Palatka, FL \$17,655

Residents living in an extremely low-income area of Palatka have organized themselves into a Neighborhood Council that is seeking empowerment and improvement of self-image within their community. They seek to do this by providing: (1) training in business skills and (2) mini-grants to individual group members wanting to start up or to up-grade small businesses within the neighborhood.

GA Avenue Coming Together, Inc., Atlanta, GA \$30,000

This goal of this project is to start the Tummy & South Cooperative Restaurant in an inner city neighborhood. The jobs produced by this venture will help many of the community members maintain their homes as many are losing them to increased taxes as the neighborhood changes.

Phoenix Labor, Augusta, GA \$13,000

According to a 2003 survey, Augusta, GA has 5,601 homeless individuals. Regular employment services do not understand and are often unwilling to employ the homeless. Temporary employment will lead to full employment, which will lead to a steady income and eventually home ownership. This project comprised of homeless, near homeless and previously homeless individuals seeks to establish such a temporary employment agency.

Re-thinking Excellence for the Advancement of Development Youth, (R.E.A.D.Y.), Columbia, MS \$20,000

Competing against adults for employment opportunities has been extremely difficult for the youth in this community. So they have decided to create their own opportunities. They developed a youth-owned and youth-run mobile concession trailer to sell refreshments at local sporting events.

Citizens For A Better Greenville, Greenville, MS \$15,000

Originally organized around educational disparities, Citizens for a Better Greenville is now the voice of a significant segment of the local population. It is a grassroots organizing effort that provides the opportunity for low-income persons to address issues that affect their lives both politically and economically.

Coast Community Drum Line, Pascagoula, MS \$20,000

There are no jobs available for high school and college age youth in this area of Mississippi. These youth created this project in order to have employment and help other youth appreciate the fine art of music. The project consists of (1) repairing and selling percussion instruments, and (2) expanding the teaching of music lessons.

The Parents of Children's World, Laurinburg, NC \$9,000

These multi-cultural groups of rural low-income parents who send their children to Children's World Preschool/Day Care have organized to correct a health/environmental situation that could close down this twenty-year old nonprofit community facility. They will accomplish this by correcting the drainage and sanitation problem of an adjacent to the facility.

Smoky Mountain Native Plants Association (SMNPA), Robbinsville, NC \$20,000

SMNPA comprised of low income people is dedicated to earning extra income through growing, collecting, processing, and marketing of Appalachian native plants; to preserving native plants for future generations, and to providing education about native species. All accomplished through education, community service, and economic development.

South (cont.)

The Southside Community Center, Inc., Lancaster, SC \$14,000

The Southside Community of Lancaster, SC is comprised of many single parent heads of household and senior citizens. There is a need for this community to help stamp out the high rate of crime, teen pregnancy and substance abuse. With assistance the group was able to purchase and renovate a building that will be used as a community center where residents will have educational opportunities, participate in recreational and social activities.

Treasures of Appalachia, Cosby, TN \$11,000

Cocke County is one of Appalachia's chronically poor areas. To get to one of America's most popular tourist destinations, The Great Smoky Mountains you have to go through Cosby which is in Cocke County. Taking advantage of this location, these project members are marketing traditional mountain crafts in an attempt to acquire supplemental income for themselves.

Youth Civic Action Team, Memphis, TN \$23,552

Youth in this community came together to create jobs for themselves while developing leadership skills and impacting their own neighborhoods. There are a significant number of abandoned and code deficient homes in four neighborhoods in Memphis. Youth from these communities have come together to learn about code enforcement and how to demolish or restore these homes thereby creating jobs for themselves, reducing crime, eliminating safety hazards, slowing the economic decline, and ridding the community of drug activity.

Queen of SHEBA, Williamsburg, VA \$20,000

This group of women have banded together to seek training in job skills and to provide support and training for one another in areas of emotional, educational and career development.

WEST

\$222,575

Humboldt Handmade Artisans & Crafters Guild, Arcata, CA \$10,000

As a cooperative, this group of artisans and crafters will now be able to share the expense of common purchases, meet regularly to network, and share equipment and other resources.

The Bakersfield Performing Arts and Philanthropic Society, Inc., Bakersfield, CA \$19,575

Low-income students at California State University Bakersfield came together to express themselves on social, political, and economical issues using performing arts as their tool. They deal with poverty, discrimination, drug abuse and many other issues facing them through their art.

Visionary Pictures, Fairfax, CA \$20,000

This group is comprised of low-income, at risk young people who represent various racial ethnic groups/cultures who have come together to create job opportunities for themselves and other disenfranchised youth.

Butterfly Network for Lupus Patients, Inglewood, CA \$20,000

Lupus is a highly misunderstood disease, and as such people with the disease are subject to job discrimination, misdiagnosis, family disintegration and insurance problems. This is a support group of people living with lupus; their goals are to educate themselves on the disease through the establishment of a library, seminars, and the development of a database of physician and experts in the field.
