## INTERNATIONAL PROJECTS

AFRICA \$100,000

# Coptic Evangelical Organization for Social Services (CEOSS), \$50,000 Egypt

This is an intermediary partner assisting primarily women and handicapped persons in the poorest regions of Cairo and rural Egypt.

#### West Africa Initiative — Liberia & Sierra Leone

\$50,000

This is an initiative between Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, Presbyterian Hunger Program, Self-Development of People and various ecumenical partners to improve the food security and economic status of communities, families and individuals through technical training, follow up technical support and small grants for project activities.

ASIA \$50,000

#### Development Promotion Group (DPG), India

\$50,000

An intermediary partner assisting primarily women, children and neglected minorities in South India with projects ranging from development to sanitation, housing and education.

# Centro de Solidaridad Para el Desarrollo de la Mujer, Inc. (CE-MUJER) – Santo Domingo, DR \$50,000

An intermediary partner committed to improving the quality of life of those living in economically poor communities by assisting in their empowerment through self-management, education, training in technical skills, income generation, health and public politics with influence on both the national and local level.

# Hopkins Farmers Cooperative Society Ltd., Stan Creek District, Belize \$19.600

A cooperative of farmers from the Hopkins Village area of Belize working together in the manufacturing of cereal from locally produced grains to be sold nationally.

# Sandy Beach Women's Cooperative Society Ltd., Stan Creek District, Belize \$20,050

Started in 1984 this is the oldest indigenous women's owned cooperative in Belize. The women are working to re-build their hotel which was destroyed by fire twice. The SDOP grant will enable them to complete their facility used for meetings, catering and selling lunch.

# Regional Ecumenical Center for Consulting and Service, (CREAS), Argentina \$50,000

An intermediary partnership supporting small projects focused on strengthening and nourishing grassroots initiatives.

## Ecumenical Fund to Support Small Projects (CESE), Brazil \$50,000

An intermediary partnership to assist grassroots groups in the areas of training, organizing, equipment purchase and small-scale production.

# **DOMESTIC PROJECTS**

MIDWEST \$68,749

## M's Southern Style, Columbus, OH

\$16,000

This cooperative restaurant provides employment and capacity building for a group of ex-offenders who were having difficulty finding employment.

# Positive Action for Education/Global Community Support, St. Louis, MO \$18,000

This group of African immigrants from Togo, Congo, Senegal and Mali specialize in hair braiding, international clothes sewing and jewelry and vocational training as a means of economic development.

## Warriors on Wheels, Detroit, MI

\$10,000

The project involves the repair and retrofitting with accessibility controls of a donated 13 passenger bus to provide transportation to meetings, events and advocacy activities for members with disabilities. Group members are nearly all low income wheel chair users residing in an area with poor public transit for all residents and little if any reliable public transportation options for people with disabilities.

#### Second Chance Lawn Care, Springfield, OH

\$4,749

This grant will provide technical assistance in business management as this group of ex felons, unemployed and displaced workers come together to form this cooperative opportunity to become self-sufficient.

### Fair Chances, Lansing, MI

\$20,000

The project will include advocacy and activities to create multiple pathways for ex offenders to reenter the workforce including: creating a process to vet out and certify the skills and risk level of ex-offenders for employers; advocacy and outreach to prospective employers to encourage opportunities for possible employment; providing job coaching and opportunities to receive hands-on experience with possible work opportunities.

NORTHEAST \$195,400

#### Lanvale Towers/Canal Tenant Associations, Baltimore, MD

This group of residents most of whom lack a high school diploma or computer skills have come together to organize around a project focused on a High School Diploma/G.E.D. and computer literacy program..

#### Vamos Unidos, New York City, NY

\$20,000

\$20,000

Street vendors from across New York City will use the funding to increase its members' participation in immigrants' rights organizing and leadership development through coalition work.

#### Crossroads Associates, Allentown, PA

\$10,400

Crossroads Drop in Center is a place where those who are homeless and/or marginalized meet three days per week for lunch, for a safe space, to read, for listening, for information and referral services and for a sense of belonging.

### A People's Agenda for Excellent Schools, New Haven, CT

The members of the group who are both students and parents of students from the New Haven Public Schools will draft a platform so that issues that most directly affect them will drive the efforts to make their schools better.

## Damayan Migrant Workers Association, Inc., New York City, NY \$20,000

This project is an organized effort to rescue Filipino women from labor trafficking and involuntary servitude.

#### No Boundaries Coalition, Baltimore, MD

\$15,000

\$20,000

This is a resident led initiative dedicated to breaking down boundaries between neighborhoods and building community.

#### A Village, Inc., Albany, NY

\$20,000

This is an initiative by a group of local residents to engage and empower their community. Group members are seeking to reclaim their neighborhoods and improve the quality of life for the residents of the south end of Albany.

### Pratt Towers, Inc., Brooklyn, NY

\$20,000

The goal of this project is to convert an unused playground into an intergenerational space for the residents of Pratt Towers who range in age from newborn to their late 90's. (This is a challenge grant with the goal of the group raising another \$15,000 by May 2013 prior to receiving the SDOP grant).

#### The Brooklyn Women's Truth Commission Project, Brooklyn, NY \$10,000

The grant will enable the group to strive towards ending police sexual harassment of African American women, provide training, media advocacy, and giving testimony in front of New York City Council about police injustices.

### New Lens, Baltimore, MD

\$20,000

This is a youth-led peer to peer capacity building and public awareness project. The youth develop and practice marketable media skills while making a video in which they interview experts talking about the state of youth jobs and about people who have been successful in creating meaningful youth jobs. The young people will use the video to organize at least 10 groups into a youth jobs coalition and to generate understanding and investment in youth jobs.

#### Safety is First in Families, West Union, WV

\$20,000

This project is designed to give group members who are mostly women the skills to recognize and deal with domestic violence. There is a high degree of domestic violence in West Union and surrounding area.

SOUTH \$145,000

### Darlington Group, Hartsville, SC

\$20,000

A group of residents of Darlington County, SC have come together to address social justice issues in the local schools, government and workplaces. They are receiving training on how to negotiate with authority figures.

### A Community Voice, New Orleans, LA

\$20,000

The project is a community center centrally located among the East New Orleans neighborhoods of the 7<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> Wards and Gentilly. The center will offer computer training, job skills training, mentoring among peers and job searches.

### Fighting for our future and Youth for Change, Orlando, FL \$20,000

The project seeks to empower youth through leadership development training that engages them to become agents of change in their communities by identifying community issues and working together with peers, community leaders, and policy makers to find and implement solutions.

### West Georgia Farmers' Cooperative, Hamilton, GA \$20,000

This project is the re-development of the West Georgia Farmers Cooperative and its fruit & vegetable production and marketing program that focuses on cooperative production, processing and distribution of local foods.

#### Homeless Solutions of Clearwater, Inc. Clearwater, FL

\$20,000

This is a group of homeless people organizing themselves to establish a thrift store in downtown Clearwater. The members will provide an equal amount of labor needed to operate the store and be paid a fair wage.

# Women Initiating Seeds of Empowerment Group (WISE), Irvington, AL $\$\,5,\!000$

Technical assistance to be used to hire a consultant to train group members in gardening, marketing and conducting a feasibility study to start a plant nursery.

# North Carolina Small Family Farming Cooperative, Watha, NC \$20,000

This farming cooperative will enable a group of farmers to build hoop houses in which they can grow vegetables almost year-round.

## Another Chance 1, Inc., Charlotte, NC

\$20,000

The grant will aide in the prevention of group members returning to substance abuse and thus introduce new life style changes. The project will help to continue the connection of those who have "been there" and those now exposed to substance abuse to avoid the risks and consequences associated with abuse.

WEST \$170,852

# Tenemos que Reclamar y Unidos Salvar la Tierrs, Central Los Angeles, CA \$20,000

This Cooperative project is dedicated to building the economic and political power of the residents of South Central Los Angeles including creating land trusts in the face of underemployment and gentrification as downtown LA spreads south and a local university expands and raises the price of housing.

## Women's Global Pathways New Mexico, Albuquerque, NM \$20,000

This project will create and sustain a training and development center for refugees and other immigrants through the use of sewing, weaving, micro- enterprise and English as a second language and skills training.

# Somos Un Pueblo Unido (Immigrants Worker's Rights Project), Santa Fe, NM \$20,000

Through this project, Latino workers learn and inform others about labor protections and remedies; organize workplace committees to develop collective strategies for better working conditions, and acquire leadership skills in order to engage in local and national campaigns advancing economic justice and worker's rights.

### Oregon Rural Action, Ontario, OR

\$20,000

In this project families prepare a local garden for planting, growing and processing food. They attend classes and share with the local Food Banks and Pantries.

# Disabled Rights Action Committee, Salt Lake City, UT \$20,000

This project seeks to provide transitional services to individuals who are languishing in nursing homes. The group members are interested in moving into their own homes and apartments. The project will screen those eligible to take a portion of their existing nursing home funding to purchase personal attendant care, adaptive equipment and other goods and services that will enable them to safely live in a semi-independent manner.

#### Chainbreaker Collective, Santa Fe, NM

\$15,000

The membership of Chainbreaker Collective comes together to provide bicycles, bicycle repair knowledge and repair equipment for themselves and other low-income residents as an alternative transportation option.

#### Western Service Workers Association, Oakland, CA \$12,852

This is an advocacy project composed of low-income persons who have banded together to fight the ravages of high utility rates by training themselves to effect change in policy.

# Workers Committee of the Center for Workers Justice, Springdale, AR \$18,000

This project will focus on advocacy and education by providing tools to improve member's language, education, computer and job skills. Group members will also advocate against wage theft and worker exploitation in the community.

## Women in the Green Economy, Seattle, WA \$20,000

This project is about providing a place for low-income women, women of color, and women from immigrant backgrounds to build leadership. The women are also organizing around access to healthy food through preservation of a farmer's market and nutrition program.

# Amani Community Garden of Encanto, San Diego, CA

Technical assistance grant for planning of the garden in terms of how the land is to be divided among the community members and to assist in board development.
