### The Lighthouse Foundation's Work in North Korea

Mr. Nam-Cheol Kang contracted polio at the age of two and cannot use his legs. In North Korea, where Mr. Kang lives, there are very few jobs for people who cannot stand or walk. In the fall of 2006, the Committee for the Protection of the Disabled and the Lighthouse Foundation, with the help of Christians in South Korea and the United States, opened workshops in Pyongyang where people with limited mobility can receive training and jobs.

After receiving a wheelchair that moves by a hand-turned crank, Nam-Cheol said, "It felt good, going for the first time in my life all around Pyongyang under my own power." Since May 2007, Mr. Kang has been repairing watches along with his new friend, Myeong-Cheol Lee.

Sue Kinsler, PC(USA) mission co-worker who leads the Lighthouse Foundation, says, "God allowed us to open the first welfare center for the disabled in North Korea, the Potonggang Welfare Center. Its sheltered workshops include a barbershop, a beauty shop, and tailoring and shoe repair workshops in which other gifted disabled work alongside those
