After the terrible floods in North Korea in 1996-1997 she learned that over one million people had died in the north from hunger and hunger-related causes. She asked God for a way she could visit and help with the problems of hunger and sickness. Since the spring of 2001 Sue has visited North Korea six times each year and gradually gained the confidence of officials there.

Originally she was asked to help the North Hwanghae Orphanage in Sariwon, south of Pyongyang. Later, Mr. Lim, a high government official, personally challenged her to provide protein-rich soy milk for 100,000 children. Her first response was shock, but when she began in anger to rebuke him, she suddenly heard the voice of God saying, "I am putting the lives of 100,000 children in your hands. Why are you angry?"
